A. COURSE NUMBER AND NAME:

NRSG 6020 – OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH NURSING ROLE DEVELOPMENT

B. CREDIT HOURS:

This is a three (3) credit hour course delivered in an online format

C. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is an introduction to Occupational Health Nursing and builds upon NRSG 6010. NRSG 6020 the role and competencies of an Occupational Health Nurse (OHN) and prepares learners to take the ABOHN Occupational Health Certification Exam.

D. COURSE OUTCOMES:

In the Annie Taylor Dee School of Nursing, each course outcome specifies the knowledge and skills that students should attain upon completion of the course. Course outcomes are based on the End-of-Program student learning outcomes (EPSLOs), which include Patient-Centered Care, Evidence-Based Practice, Teamwork and Collaboration, Safety, Quality Improvement, and Informatics. - 2. Interpret threats to worker safety through job hazard analysis and risk assessments
- 3. Critique the role of the OHN in direct care, case management and disability resources
- 4. Investigate the role of the OHN in preparing for workplace emergencies through planning and resource availability
- 5. Examine the importance of wellness programs and health promotion within the boundaries of Occupational Health
- 6. Weigh the importance of research and evidence-based practice in the field of Occupational Health
